AGRICULTURAL EDUCATION and FFA

A BRIEF HISTORY

1917 – Smith Hughes National Vocational Education Act establishes vocational agriculture programs in public schools.

1924 – The Wisconsin Association of Vocational Agriculture Instructors (WAVAI) was officially established at the state summer conference with W.C. Christenson as the President.

1928 – A group of young farmers came together in Kansas City, Missouri and founded the “Future Farmers of America (FFA).” The organization was designed to provide leadership opportunities for students involved in vocational agriculture.

1929 – The Wisconsin Association of FFA was formed in October of 1929 to further develop a support structure for agricultural education. The first State President was Donald James of Dodgeville.

1929 – The official colors, National Blue and Corn Gold were adopted by the National FFA, and are still used today.

1930 – The Official FFA Creed is adopted at the 3rd National FFA Convention. The 5 paragraphs of the creed were written by E.M. Tiffany, a professor of agriculture education at the University of Wisconsin.

1931 – The first American Farmers from Wisconsin, Parmley Harris and Bernard Smith, received their FFA degrees.

1933 – The FFA Jacket with the FFA emblem on the back is adopted as the Official Dress.

1947 – The first National FFA Band performed at the National FFA Convention under the direction of Dr. Henry Brunner.

1948 – The first National FFA Chorus and Talent performed at the National FFA Convention

1950 – Public Law 81-740 - The FFA is granted a federal charter by the United States Congress. This makes FFA an intracurricular component of education.

1965 – The New Farmers of America (NFA), an organization for African-American agriculture students merge with the FFA.

1969 – The FFA allows women to become members.

1971 – The National FFA Alumni Association was formed to provide further support to the FFA.

1972 – The Wisconsin FFA Alumni Association was formed to support Wisconsin FFA members.

1983 – The Wisconsin FFA Foundation was formed through the work of Arnold B. Cordes.

1988 - The official organization name was changed to The National FFA Organization to reflect the broadening field of agriculture, which today encompasses more than 300 careers ranging from agriscience to biotechnology to turf grass management.

1992 - The Wisconsin FFA Center is created to assist in the continual delivery of FFA programs for students because of budget cuts at the Department of Public Instruction.

1994 - Wisconsin FFA holds its last convention with the American Baptist Assembly in Green Lake, Wisconsin. The convention moves to the Madison Civic Center and Concourse Hotel in June of 1995.

1995 - The Wisconsin FFA Hall of Fame was created. First inducted members were Arnold B. Cordes, Floyd J. Doering and Virgil O. Martinson.

1997 - Wisconsin FFA Convention moves to the Dane County Exposition Center in Madison, Wisconsin. (Currently known as the Alliant Energy Center of Dane County). Previously the first conventions were held at the Madison Civic Center after leaving Green Lake.

1999 - National FFA Convention moves to Louisville, Kentucky, after 70 years in Kansas City, Missouri.

2001 - Wisconsin FFA holds its first Agriscience Fair at the State FFA Convention in Madison, Wisconsin.

2003 - WAVAI (Wisconsin Association of Vocational Agriculture Instructors) changes name to WAAE (Wisconsin Association of Agricultural Educators).

2004 - Jackie Mundt is elected as the National FFA President.

2006 - National FFA Convention moves to Indianapolis, Indiana

2006 - Matt Anderson served as the Chairman of the National FFA Officer Nominating Committee

2007 - Wisconsin Agricultural Education and Workforce Development Council was created.

2008 - Nick Palkowski served as the Chairman of the National FFA Officer Nominating Committee

2009 - Nicole Nelson is hired as the Wisconsin FFA Foundation Executive Director

2010 - Governor Jim Doyle signs into law Assembly Bill 236 allowing certain agriculture classes to be applied as science credits for high school graduation.

2010 - A permanent FFA emblem is placed on display in the Alliant Energy Center Exhibition Hall Atrium. The FFA emblem was created by the Turtle Lake FFA chapter. Advisor Mr. Don Dipprey.

2010 - BJ Chrisler served as the Chairman of the National FFA Officer Nominating Committee

2010 - National FFA Advisor Dr. Larry Case retires.

2010 - MFE and ALD Conferences changed names to 212^o and 360^o Conferences. Over 600 FFA members attended these newly revised conferences in Green Bay.

2010 – National FFA offers a new Affiliation Fee Program for FFA membership. Wisconsin has 22 chapters that have decided to select this option instead of paying traditional FFA dues.

2011 – The Summer Professional Development Conference of WAAE moves to Green Bay from Madison.

The new Ag Career Network is used for FFA membership.

2012 – Aaron Zimmerman becomes the first member in Wisconsin FFA history to be recognized with multiple star awards, winning the Wisconsin Star Farmer, Wisconsin Star in Agribusiness and Wisconsin Star in Agriscience.

2013 – District Speaking Contest registration goes online.

The First Rally to Fight Hunger Service Project occurred at the Wisconsin FFA Convention. Wisconsin FFA members raised over \$10,000 to package 70,000 meals to fight hunger.

Wisconsin FFA Foundation Director Sara Schoenborn is hired.

Wisconsin Team Ag Website including the Wisconsin FFA website gets major revisions.

The 2013-14 National FFA Officer team was hosted by Wisconsin for their National Officer Experience Training.
